Introduction to Bilateral Social Agreements

In our American history prior to our Revolution, local assemblies, known as Committees of Safety, first wrote out their grievances against the crown, and used that as the founding document that created their safety committees. Most of those grievances were later turned into the Constitution and Bill of Rights. You will be presented with a Bilateral Social Agreement that each county can use as a starting point for your own county assembly. What you see was done by a collective of students of political history in Florida and other states, intending to re-inhabitate our Republics. It was then adjusted by an Indiana County Assembly and several interim state officials to be adapted for use here in Indiana. Jim Costa is a business specialist who also was a Paralegal and has been active in the restoration of the constitutional Republic from the git go. His advice is, "Keep your writings short, general and directly to the point. Leave out all emotions and useless descriptive language, and getting down to the simplest of words, such as "freedom of speech" or "right to bear arms". Avoid details not needed. So, to sum up, the immediate business of the County Assembly is to ratify or alter their Bilateral Agreement then have the county officials sign it. This then becomes the Purpose of the Group - to right those grievances. No one else outside of the local membership will ever see that agreement."
